six legs




four legs

many legs!




On Land

Most animals that live on land have legs. Animals can have different numbers of legs.

to move.




Do You Know?

Birds, bats, and many
insects use wings to fly.
Animals can have two
wings or four wings.



Bald eagles' wings stretch
wider than a bathtub is long!



This chick is too young to fly.

Chicks can't fly until they grow strong feathers.




This butterfly has wings with colorful spots.

These bees have wings you can see through.




Bat wings have a special shape.

Animal wings come in many shapes and sizes.



In Water

Fish use fins and tails to move through the water.



Flippers push water and help an animal steer.

Whales have fins and flippers.
But seals, sea lions, and sea turtles only have flippers.



Penguins walk slowly on land.



Penguins cannot fly, but they can swim very well.

Penguins are birds, but they have flippers instead of wings. Penguins swim to hunt fish in the ocean. On land, they can walk, or they can slide on their bellies.




bird feet that are webbed
