Who Invented Basketball?



In 1891, a peach basket gave James Naismith an idea that would revolutionize a new sport-basketball. James sought to invent an indoor game to play during the winter months that encouraged interaction. Players tossed a soccer ball into a peach basket suspended from a ten-foot pole. Ten years later, people decided to cut a hole in the bottom of the basket. The game of basketball grew in popularity like wildfire. The original game consisted of thirteen rules. Some thought this new game should be called Naismith Ball, but James gave it the official name of basketball.

Starfish



Those five-pointed echinoderms are my favorite creatures to find. Known as a sea star, a starfish is not a fish at all. It has a circular disc in the middle of its body surrounded by five sections or arms. Their bodies might feel slightly spiky or rough. If a starfish loses one of its arms, it can generate or regrow a brand new arm within about a year. A starfish's tiny tube feet on the underside of its body help it to stay mobile while searching for food like scallops or clams. Predators may include sea otters, fish, and birds. Starfish may be seen in shallow or deep ocean water.

Jackie Robinson



"A life is not important except in the impact it has on other lives." When Robinson was called to play for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947, he knew his decision to play as the first African-American baseball player in the major leagues would have a major impact. Facing racist remarks, critics, and other teams refusing to play against him, he courageously played second base. Jackie went on to play on All-Star teams six times and became Most Valuable Player in 1949. The athletic boy from Georgia paved the way as an adult for future black athletes to play sports without discrimination.

Bessie Coleman



Bessie Coleman was the first black woman to receive her pilot's license in the world. "The air is the only place free from prejudice," said Coleman. After receiving her pilot's license in 1922 in France, she returned to the U.S. and made her first flight as an African American woman. During a time in U.S. history when there was discrimination against black people, Coleman became an aviation pioneer. She performed stunts, parachuted and did flying trick aerial shows. While practicing for one show, her plane crashed and Coleman was killed. Bessie was only 34 years old.
