Why teach spelling generalizations?

Spelling generalizations are not necessarily the same as RULES. Often people think of the word, rule, and assume it's 100% effective. A generalization shows that when it comes to spelling, MOST of the time, here is a system that applies that is mostly reliable.

Teaching spelling generalizations can:

- help to build a child's understanding of orthographic patterns
- provide useful and meaning-filled practice that helps to build a sense of reliability and trust
- help a child begin to learn how to self-monitor their own spelling.

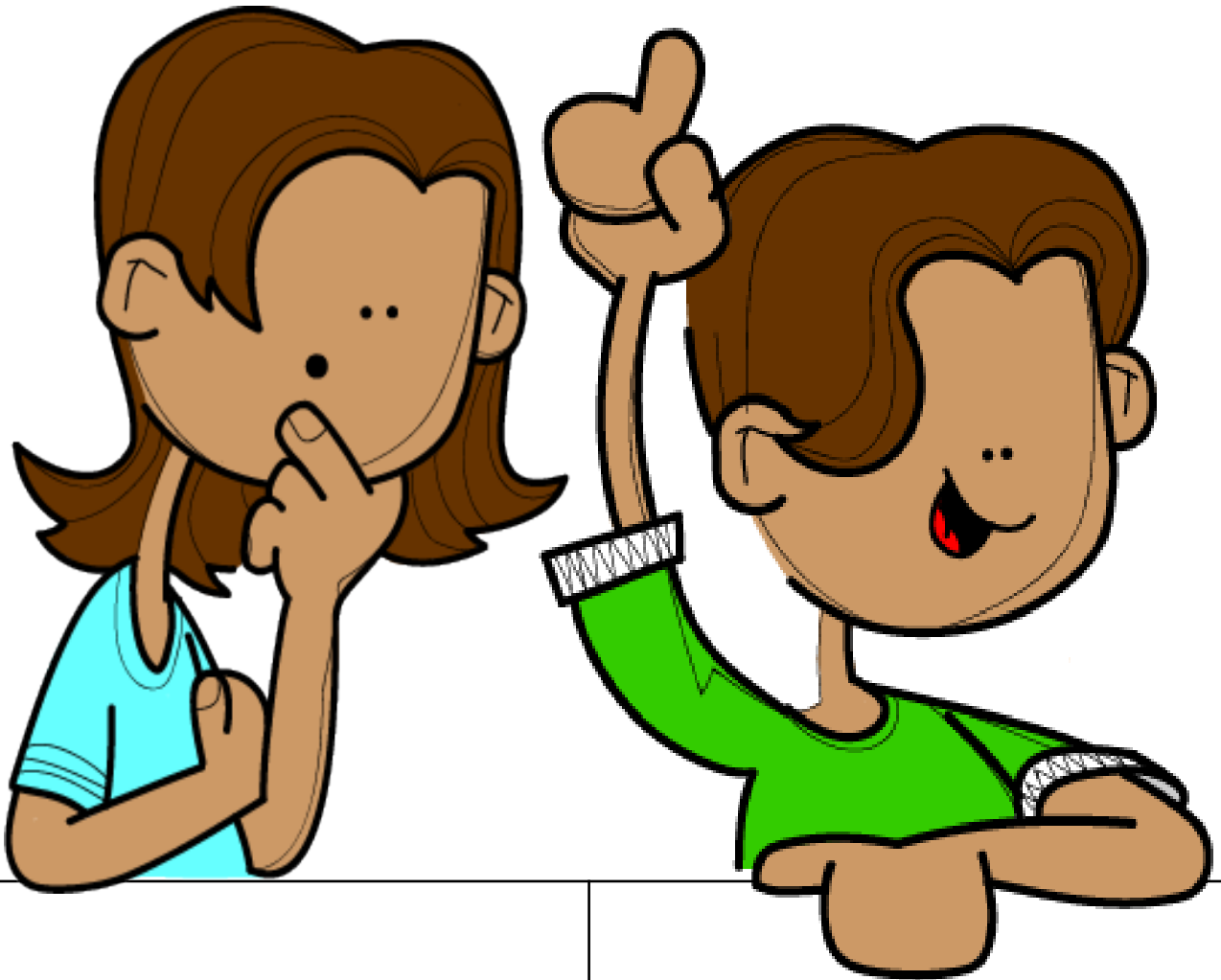

Look At What I Saw In August!

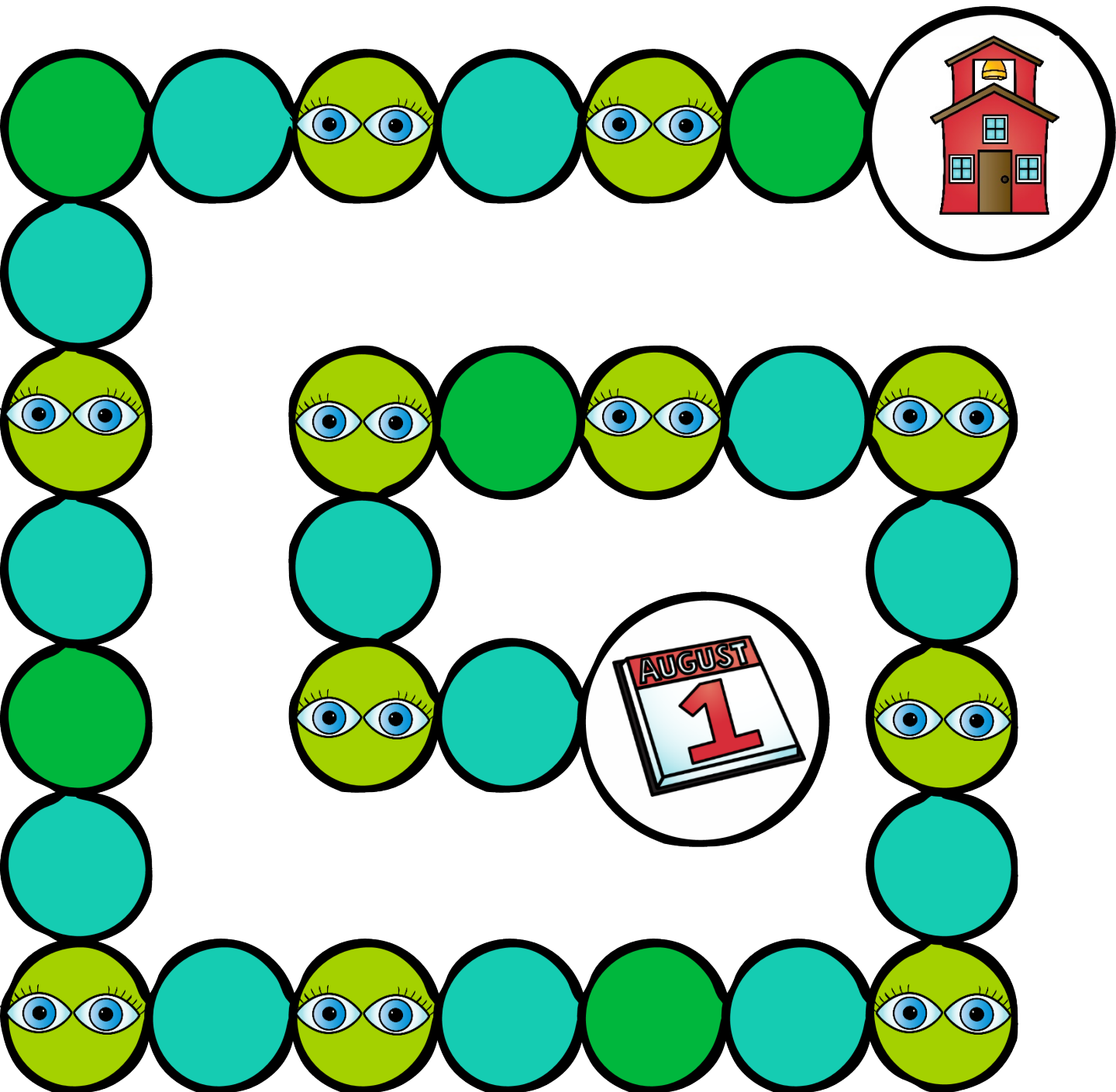
Skill: Practice spelling words with AU and AW.

Materials: Two dry erase boards, markers and eraser, one set of word cards cut apart and shuffled (be sure to double-side the pages of word cards), and placed in a cup or hat, one six-sided die, one game board, game pieces for place holders

How To Play:

1. Decide who will take the first turn.
2. All players start at the August space on the game board.
3. Roll the die. Take a card. If it has a picture with a word, then both players read it, and both will spell and write the word together on their white boards.
4. Choose a card with a star in the corner: Read the word and use it in a sentence.
5. Land on an eyes space: Say, "I saw (using the word on the card and adding a silly phrase to finish the sentence)... in August." Then, follow through with the other steps mentioned above. Example: I saw a ghost haunt the teacher's lunchroom in August!
6. Players switch and follow directions 3-6.
7. The person to reach the school building on the last space first, will win!

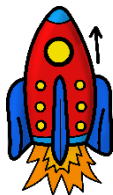

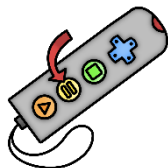

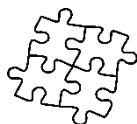
