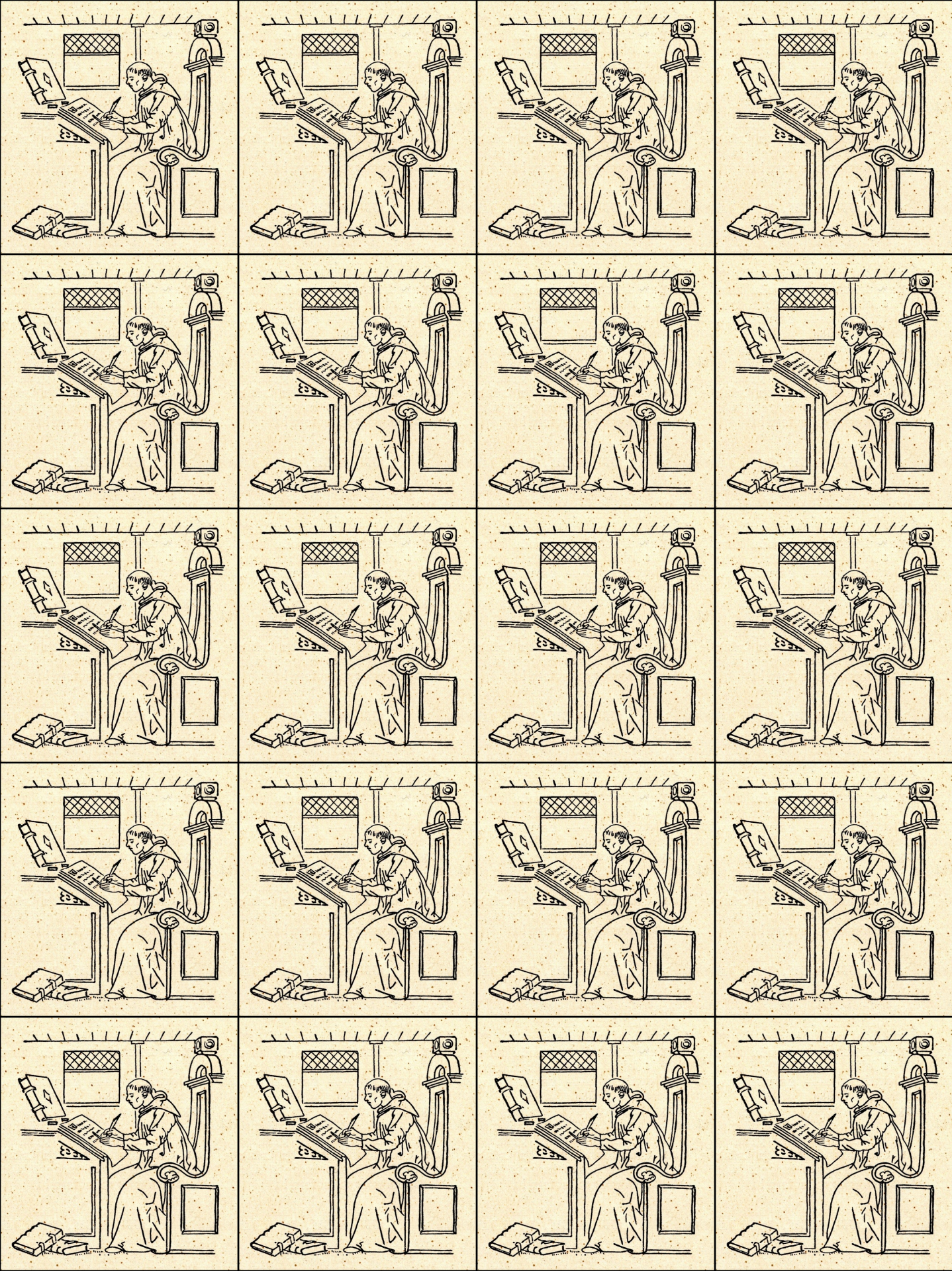
Monks and Scribes

Skill: Practice Reading and writing words with Scribal O.

Materials: Dry erase board, markers and eraser, one set of word cards per player, cut apart (double-side to the cards with monk on the front), dry erase markers and erasers

How To Play:

1. Shuffle the word cards very well. Arrange them in a 4 by 4 array.
2. On a turn: players flip two cards over and read them out loud. Try to make a match. You can make a match if...
 - two word cards have o before -m
 - two word cards have o before -n
 - two word cards have o before -ve
 - two word cards have o before -th
3. If a match is made, the turn is over.
4. Any time a player flips a card with a monk, they need to be the scribe by writing the word in cursive on their white board. Say the letter names out loud as they write it.
5. The player with the most matches wins the game.
