


Orton-Gillingham Advanced Word Lists Level One




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
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Dear Educator,

Thank you for your purchase! This is a set of advanced word lists and sentences for level one, Orton-Gillingham. It is recommended for students who are ready for more advanced work within this level.

There are no lists which focus singularly on single consonant phonograms. Rather, the lists consolidate learning of short vowels and lead to more advanced blends, digraphs, a combination of both and syllable patterns.

Your student(s) may be ready to handle multisyllabic syllable patterns that match the skills in level one. This resource will accommodate that need. Please note that a few lists have ending syllable patterns with schwa sounds. It is up to the teacher and/or tutor's discretion to decide if you would like to use these lists for further practice with a particular syllable pattern.

I will be creating more advanced word list packs during spring and summer, 2018. There will be a bundled version, which will also be added to The Complete O.G. Part 2 bundle as scheduled. I have included the table of contents for the other levels, so that you may get a glance at what will be next.


