Fact File: The Arctic Region



Fast facts:

- The Arctic is the furthest point north on Earth.
- Arctic comes from the Greek word Arktos, which means “near the bear.”
- Global warming has caused this region to shrink over the years.

If you travel to the furthest point north on Earth, you have reached the Arctic Circle, a vast and cold place on our planet. Filled with fascinating plants and animals, over 4 million people inhabit the Arctic Region. The Arctic is made up of the Arctic Ocean, parts of Canada, Russia, USA, Greenland, Norway, Finland, Sweden, and Iceland. Known for its extreme cold temperature, the Arctic is around -68°C (-90°F).

Indigenous, or native people named Inuit, have learned to adapt to the challenging conditions of this large region. Arctic animals such as foxes, wolverines, squirrels, hares, birds, and seals have special adaptations to help them survive as well.

Due to climate change and global warming, parts of the Arctic are actually shrinking. Rising temperatures and shrinking ice can have serious and harmful effects on the region. Studying the way of life in the Arctic Region helps us to realize how important it is to protect all living creatures.

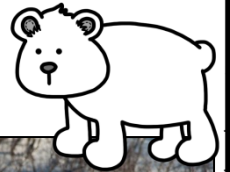

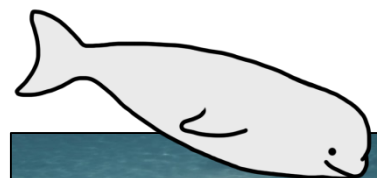
1. Polar bears are large carnivores and excellent swimmers. Up to 10 feet long and over 1,700 pounds, their main diet in the Arctic is seals and walruses. Their top coat looks white, but it's actually clear-colored fur. This helps them stay warm, dry and to camouflage. A layer of black fur is underneath.

What are 2 features a polar bear has to adapt to the Arctic?

2. A Beluga whale is a short, white whale. Beluga means white one in Russian. Belugas are very social creatures. They travel together in pods of 2-25 whales to hunt or migrate all around the Arctic. Their main diet consists of fish, squid, worms and octopi.

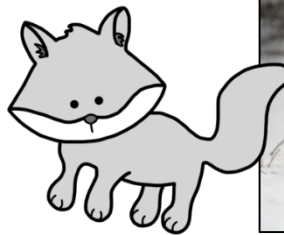

3. Arctic foxes are carnivores, who unlike the beluga whale, hunt alone. Their fur is white during the winter and grayish-brown during the summer. They have long bushy tails called a sweep. The sweep can help an arctic fox when it's trying to change directions, or just to keep warm while it's sleeping.

Question: How could the sweep keep a fox warm while sleeping?



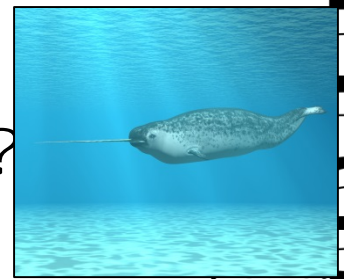
4. Snowy Owls are among the largest owls in North America. Unlike many other owls, they usually hunt during the daytime. Their sharp, pointy beaks and feather covered claws make it easy to search for lemmings, a snowy owl's main food source. Check out the photo of a snowy owl yawning in the corner!

5. There's no mistaking a narwhal in the Arctic. About the size of a beluga whale, it has a long, spiraled spear **jutting** out of its head. The spear is actually a tooth! It can grow up to 10 feet (3m) long. Scientists aren't certain, but they determined the tooth may be used to attract a mate, as defense against enemies or even as a way to sense changes in the water.

Question: In this paragraph, what part of speech is **jutting**? What does **jutting** mean?



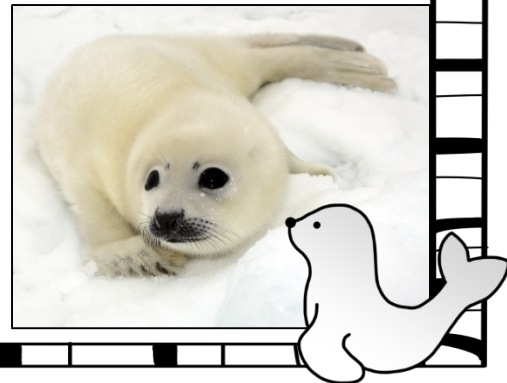
6. Puffins are sometimes called sea parrots for their large, bright bills. The bill is said to attract a mate. Both male and female puffins will create a nest in the side of a cliff called a burrow. They lay their eggs and raise their young. Baby puffins stay in the burrow since they are unable to fly. Both puffin Mom and Dad take turns bringing fish back to the burrow to feed their young.

Question: Infer: Why is a burrow a good place for puffins to raise their young?



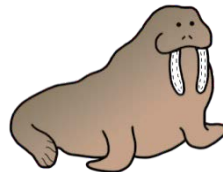
7. Harp seals spent most of their time swimming and diving in the frigid waters of the Arctic Ocean. They are social creatures and travel together in colonies. Even young seal pups will huddle together on the frozen ice, waiting for their mothers to bring their next meal. They'll soon join other seals in the water and begin to hunt for fish.

Question: What are 3 plural nouns in this paragraph?



8. Long tusks, a large mustache and a thick layer of blubber keep the walrus fit to thrive in the Arctic. Blubber is a thick layer of fat underneath the skin. It helps to insulate, or hold in heat of warm-blooded animals. Blubber also helps marine animals in the arctic keep their buoyancy, or stay afloat. A walrus depends on plenty of blubber for survival.

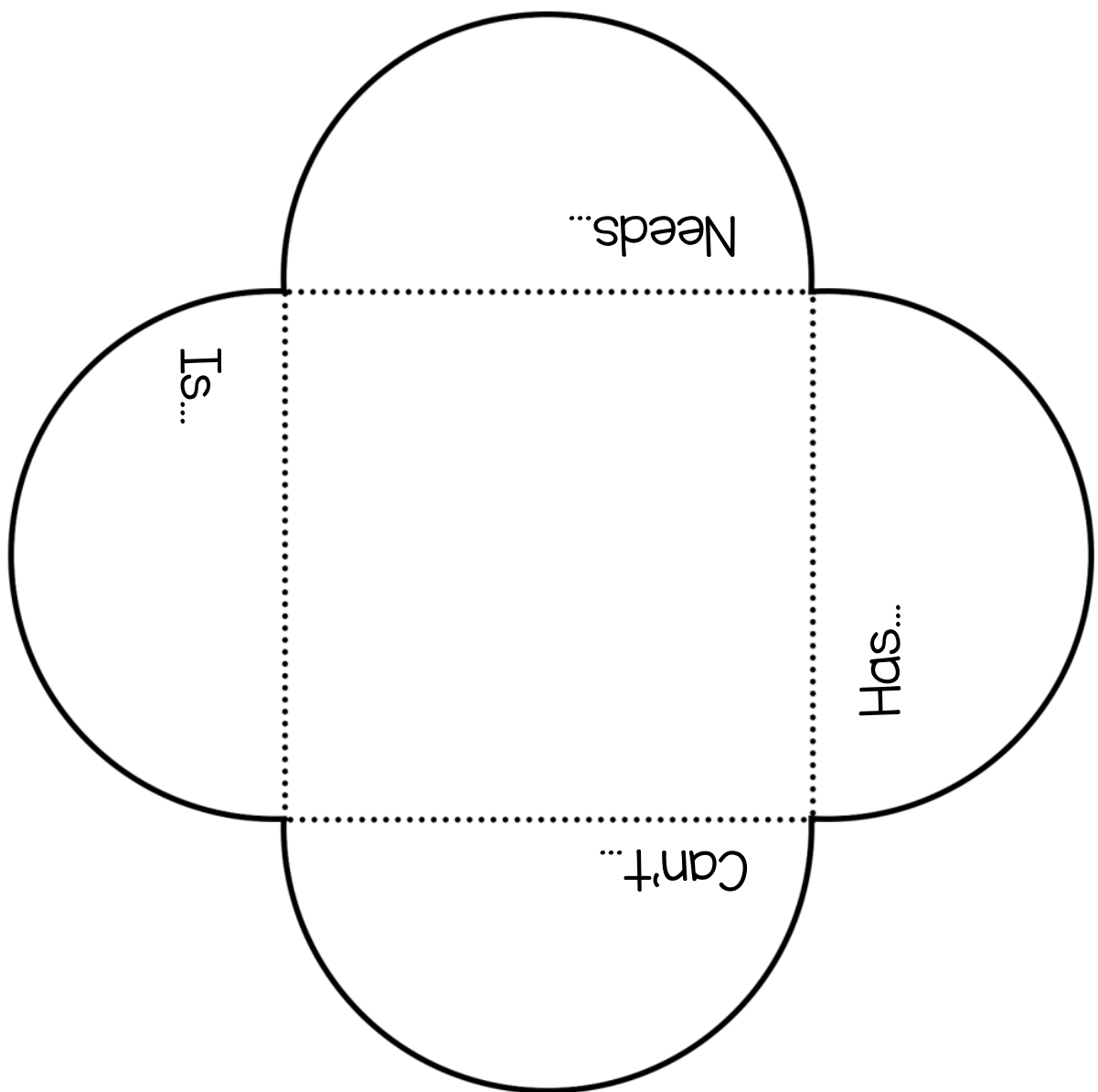

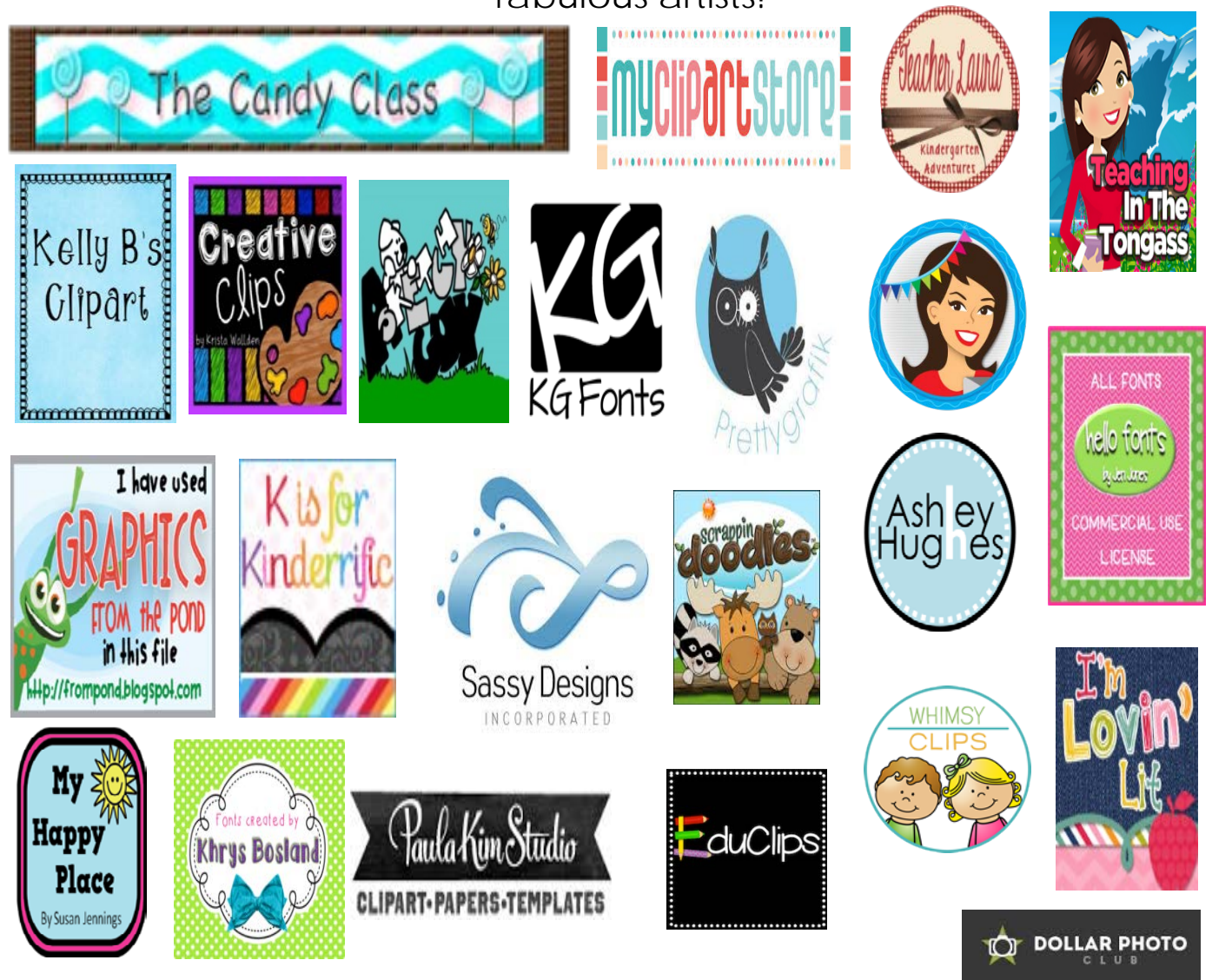
