




Non-Fiction Task Cards *November*



Fact File: Turkey Talk



Fast facts:

- Wild turkeys sleep in trees to stay safe from predators.
- Only male turkeys will gobble.
- They have nearly 270 degree vision.
- Wild turkeys were once nearly extinct.

When you think about a turkey, what's the first thing that comes to your mind? Is it Thanksgiving dinner, or something else? Wild turkeys are similar to the turkeys we eat, but there are a few differences. They usually weigh less and can fly more easily and faster than domestic, or farm raised turkeys.

Wild turkeys are omnivores, or plant and meat eaters. They may eat acorns, nuts, seeds, and berries, as well as small amphibians and reptiles. You'll find them all over woodland areas, near swamps and grasslands. At night, they prefer to sleep up in the trees to protect themselves from predators.

The wild turkey nearly became extinct in the early 1900s due to overhunting and loss of habitat. Thousands of trees were cut down to make way for new roads and homes, cities, towns and farmland. Thankfully, humans worked hard to restore, or bring back the population. The United States now has over 7 million wild turkeys. This large fowl can now be seen in nearly 49 states. Can you guess which state you wouldn't?

1. Wild turkeys are large birds, found mostly in North America. The males are called toms or gobblers. The females are called hens. Their babies are called poult. A group of turkeys is called a rafter or a flock.

3. Read the following letter from Benjamin Franklin to his daughter.

"For my own part I wish the Bald Eagle had not been chosen the Representative of our Country. He is a Bird of bad moral Character. He does not get his Living honestly. You may have seen him perched on some dead Tree near the River, where, too lazy to fish for himself, he watches the Labour of the Fishing Hawk; and when that diligent Bird has at length taken a Fish, and is bearing it to his Nest for the Support of his Mate and young Ones, the Bald Eagle pursues him and takes it from him.

...For the Truth the Turkey is in Comparison a much more respectable Bird, and withal a true original Native of America . . . He is besides, though a little vain & silly, a Bird of Courage, and would not hesitate to attack a Grenadier of the British Guards who should presume to invade his Farm Yard with a red Coat on."

4. A male turkey gobbles, but a female doesn't. A gobble can be heard by humans from almost a mile away. Males gobble to attract females. Wild turkeys can make as many as 30 different bird calls.

5. A female wild turkey may weigh from 5-12 pounds, while a male can weigh from 11-24 pounds. Wild turkeys have strong legs and can run up to 25 mph, and fly up to 55 mph at top speed.
