Fact File: An Apple A Day



Fast facts:

- The first apple trees were planted in Central Asia.
- China produces the most apples in the world.
- There's more than 7,000 varieties of apples grown in the world today.

Have you ever heard the old saying, “An apple a day keeps the doctor away?” Not only are apples the most commonly grown fruit in the world, they’re packed with nutrition, too.

Apples are loaded with vitamin C, a powerful antioxidant. Antioxidants are molecules that can help fight against diseases. Grapes, kiwi fruit, and blueberries are other healthy fruits packed with antioxidants.

Apples are also high in fiber. When you eat foods that are rich in fiber, they can keep both your heart and your digestive system running smoothly. Other foods rich in fiber are raspberries, pears, pasta and peas. Drinking plenty of water with a fiber-packed snack will help keep your body healthy.

So, the next time you go grocery shopping, check out the produce section. Inspect the variety of apples offered. Choose a different kind you may not have tried before. Once you decide on your favorite variety, make it your top snack choice!
