Learning about Idioms:

Idiom: Let's dive in!

Meaning: The word dive often refers to jumping arms first in a body of water. Since idioms can't be translated literally, as a culture, people learn that "let's dive in" means "let's begin!"

Idiom: Don't chicken out!

Meaning: The idiom "don't chicken out" has nothing to do with the animal called a chicken. Instead, it means "don't give up!"

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Teacher instructions:

1. Cut out the following idioms.
2. Assign one idiom to every 2 or 3 students (not out loud).
3. Students get in their groups of 2 or 3 and quietly plan a way to act out the idiom WITHOUT USING WORDS (if available, props can be used)..
4. The idea is to keep each idiom a secret until they act it out.
5. The only words the group can use are "BEGIN" and "END" to indicate they are starting and to indicate they are finished acting it out.
6. The rest of the class WAITS until the performing group says "DONE" and then raises a hands if they have a guess about which idiom it could be.

** This is a great culminating activity after the students have learned the idioms. Have so much fun!



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
